Course Description:

In this course, students will read through a selection of some of Shakespeare's most popular and enduring comedies. They will read and discuss the plays, answering and asking questions about the characters, plot, setting, style, and language of the works, as well as the distinctive features of his comedies as a genre. In addition, selected passages will be available for dramatic readings in class. They will consider Shakespeare within the context of his own time, examine the influences and sources Shakespeare drew from, and observe the legacy of these plays down to our own time. The course will focus on appreciating and enjoying the humor, depth, and influence of Shakespeare, while encouraging the students to explore the characters, themes, and cultural influence of the plays.

Assignments:

- *Short Papers*: These are short papers (2-4 pages, or 500-1000 words) designed to get students thinking about and reacting to what they read. Students will choose from a range of supplied topics. 20% each (40% total)
- *Quizzes:* These are weekly quizzes on the reading, intended to show that the student has finished and understood the assignments. 30%
- *Final Paper:* Students will write one longer paper (4-6 pages, or 1000-1500 words), exploring in detail the literary techniques and meaning of a chosen play. This paper is worth 30%.
